The Feb. 26-27 meeting of the IASC Board was held at J.S. Morton West High School, Berwyn, Ill. Student members present included Dave Butterfield, Dave Hasan, Pat Johns, Linda Platt, Michelle Liszewski, Tracy Enloe and John Ambrosia.

Advisors in attendance included Ed Phelps, Jerry Denoyer, Lou Nettlehorst, George Klein, Jim Hindeland and Penny Heiligenstein.

Highlights of the meeting follow:

Dave Hasan, 1st vice-president, reported on the seminars for the state convention. "Student Government after High School" will be presented by Claire Harrison, Doug Skolowski and Paul Miltonberger.

Dave presented additional information on the Credentials, Resolutions, and Discussion Group Committees for the convention. Proposed convention topics, and Discussion Group leaders and recorders were reviewed.

It was decided that Swap Shops would be divided into two groups, one for schools over 1,000 students, one for those under 1,000 students.

Pat Johns, 2nd vice-president, presented project school topics and application forms.

**THE TREASURER'S REPORT**, submitted by Tracy Enloe, included an audit report and the current status of the treasury. The audit, which covered the period of Aug. 28, 1975 to Aug. 31, 1976, was done by Ray J. Potthast.

The audit was accepted and a copy will be sent to H. David Fry.

The total income for the 1976-1977 period as of Feb. 25 is \$4272.12. Total expenditures are \$3885.50, leaving a balance of \$385.62.

Tracy also presented an up-dated list of member schools. A recommendation was made that membership certificates be numbered, thereby giving each member school a membership number.

Linda Platt, convention secretary, reported on convention plans. She also presented the information that would be con-

tained in the convention packet which will be sent to the schools.

John Ambrosia resigned his position as REPORTER editor. In his resignation, John cited personal reasons and financial misunderstanding with the Board as causes for his action.

**BECAUSE MEMBER SCHOOL** dues have not come in as soon as they did in previous years, the treasury has lacked the funds budgeted to cover several issues of the REPORTER, causing their cancellations and John's resignation.

Discussion concerning the REPORTER followed. It was decided that Penny Heiligenstein, REPORTER advisor, and J.S. Morton High School will continue the REPORTER with the March-April issue.

Heidi Garland presented information on the Student Advisory Committee to the Illinois Board of Education. She requested a discussion and seminar group at the convention. Discussion followed and her request was approved.

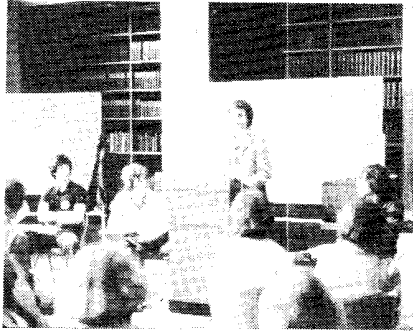
Ed Phelps, executive secretary, submitted financial statements for the Portland and Atlanta NASC bus trips. He also submitted the proposed list of activities for 1977-1978.

Information on District-State Liasons was then distributed by Ed. An IASC District Report to the Executive Secretary, which is to be submitted after each District meeting, was also drawn up. The District-State Liason will be chosen at the state convention this year.

Ed reported he is also trying to set up an IASC District-Advisor-at Large Report to the Executive Secretary. A form was drawn.

Lou Nettlehorst presented Paul Mueller's promotional director's report. (see chart p. 8). A discussion followed. The report was accepted, and a motion was made and accepted that as soon as the IASC finances are stable, the Board would reloan the money to Paul so the business can expand.

**OTHER ITEMS DISCUSSED** included the amendments submitted by Lake Forest High School, a letter received by Dave Butterfield concerning railroad crossing accidents and safety, and the 1st Year Advisor-at-Large position left vacant by Burt Showers' resignation.

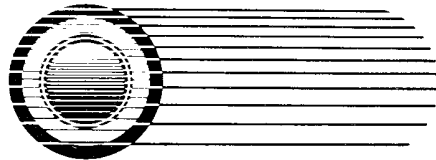

given

With the selection of a new IASC Workshop Director approaching, guidelines for selection have been given by the IASC. The guidelines are as follows:

- I. Qualifications
  - A. Five years experience as a student council advisor.
  - B. Attendance at an IASC convention.
  - C. Attendance at a district convention.
  - D. Staff member at a state workshop.

Note: In the event no one desiring the position of IASC Workshop Director possesses the above qualifications, the Executive Board may modify the qualifications in order that one or more individuals desiring the position will be eligible for nomination.

- II. Selection Procedure
  - A. At the end of the term of the Workshop Director a committee composed of the Executive Secretary, the First Year Advisor-at-Large, the Second Vice-President and the Treasurer shall receive and consider names of persons for nomination. After examination of the qualifications of these individuals, the committee shall submit the name of qualified individuals to the Executive Board along with their recommendations.
  - B. Upon receipt of the committee's report, the Executive Board shall select the Executive Secretary by the votes of its members. In order to be selected, a nominee shall receive a majority of the votes of the Executive Board.
  - C. The selection of the Workshop Director shall be made at the Executive Board meeting in the spring at the annual convention. He shall start his term of office at the September Executive Board meeting.

## Small schools are noticed

If you are a student council member at a small school, do you get the feeling that only "big schools" control district and state activities?

Serena, a school with an enrollment of 315 students currently serves as the home school for the IASC State President, Dave Butterfield, the Prairie 8 District President, myself, and the La Salle County Sub-District Chairman, Rick Salzer.

As little as 3 years ago, Serena was not even a member of Prairie 8, let alone the IASC. What reasons do the council members attribute to their great success on the State, District, and sub-district levels? Here are a few:

1. The rewriting of the council constitution to insure proper methods for channeling ideas to the faculty and administration.

2. The educating of the council members that by following the constitution and proper channels, they could submit new ideas and changes which would be accepted if they were logically justified.

3. Having students in attendance at all sub-district events, district conventions and workshops, state workshops and the IASC convention.

4. Joining the district, state, and national association one at a time and finding out whether each move is worthwhile.

5. A voice is choosing an advisor who is willing to work and is easy to work with.

6. Having hard-working and dedicated students who are inspired by the enthusiasm generated by the activities attended and experiences received, thus creating a cycle.

Because there are so many schools that are as active as most of the big schools in the state, I feel that the small schools have no grounds for refusing to join their sub-district, district or the IASC.

I sincerely believe they should be doing something instead of using the size as a cop-out and complaining about their lack of influence.

They must remember that each member school gets one and only one vote and that all schools, regardless of size, have the same attendance quota at state workshops and conventions.

In the animal society, there are many magnificent species. Prominent examples are the beautiful peacock, the statuesque elephant, the clever fox and the chattering chimpanzee.

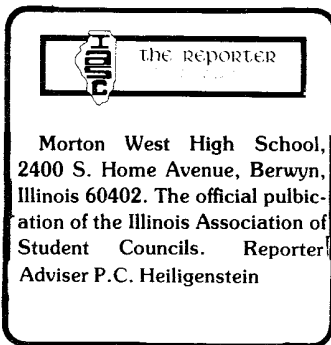
But behold the ant, with its angular body, minute stature, its painfully slow movement and total muteness. Yet in the scheme of nature, it is surely a magnificent animal.

The answer to this is not hard, but you have to be willing to let the people in the community know what student council is here for; what its purpose is.

Your student council may be asked to have a representative come to a meeting. S/he may be asked to answer questions about your reasons for wanting to send someone to this workshop. The answer to your money problems is scholarships.

Our student council at Edwardsville High School receives scholarships from various

organizations in our community, such as; the Jaycees, the Kiwanis, the Knights of Columbus, the Optimists and the Rotary. These are just a few of the community organizations which may give scholarships.

Each year, when the IASC summer workshop application is received, we mail letters to each of the organizations in town. The letter explains about the workshop and requests scholarships to send students to them.

Mr. Ron Ganschinietz, Assistant Principal at Collinsville Senior High School was injured seriously in March when he was shot in the chest while at school.

The shooting took place at 12:35 p.m. at the Collinsville High Greenwood campus, 2201 South Morrison St.

About 20 persons were lined up in the school hallway buying tickets for the Collinsville-East St. Louis basketball game, police said.

Ron has been actively involved in the I.A.S.C. for many years and has served as the Director of the Summer Leadership Workshop at McKendree College for nine years.

During the Leadership Workshop, Ron is affectionately known as the "invisible man." He is the man behind the scenes of the workshop, who organizes it and keeps it running smoothly, but modestly maintains a low profile during the events of the workshop.

He is, however, always ready and willing to aid an advisor or student with any problem whether minor or major.

Ron is currently recuperating at his home in Collinsville where he will review applications and supervise the selection of junior counselors and advisors for this summer's I.A.S.E. Leadership Workshop.
