She was also elected to the position of Edwardsville High School Student Council President from 1983-85. She then was elected to President of the IASC during the 1984-85 school year.

Valerie graduated from Edwardsville High School in 1985, and then attended Indiana University, where she earned a business major in marketing. There she became the Marketing Club President, and also Vice-President and President of the AIESEC (International Association of Students in Business and Economics). Throughout her college career, Valerie stayed very active in the

IASC by staffing the Millikin Summer Workshop. She graduated from Indiana University in 1989, and then began work for Armstrong World Industries, where she started in the Floor Division, which is located in Cleveland, Ohio. She was promoted in May of 1991 to the National Accounts Division, which is located in the Baltimore/Washington area. Valerie is now beginning work on her MBA at George Washington University.

The other keynote speaker the IASC Executive Board has in store for you is Pat Hurley. Pat Hurley is known as a humorist, speaker, and an entertainer. Pat spoke to his first high school in 1970. Since 1970, he has addressed over four million parents and students in over 4,000 schools. Mr. Hurley has achieved many accomplishments. He has produced 17 educational videos, has been the author of six books for young people, and has won two Emmy Awards for children's television.

The IASC Executive Board encourages you to visit the Hall of Ideas, Project Schools, and the Exhibitors Hall. The IASC also has many discussion groups planned for you, where you can learn

parliamentary procedure, or learn how to deal with your stress.

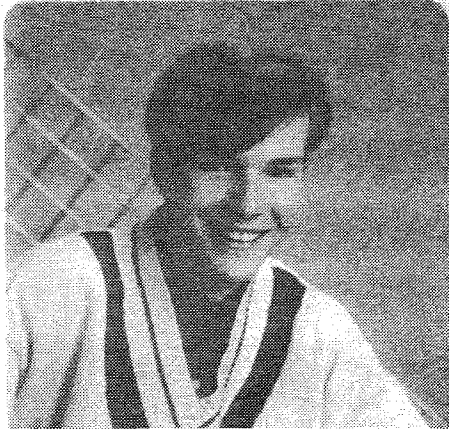

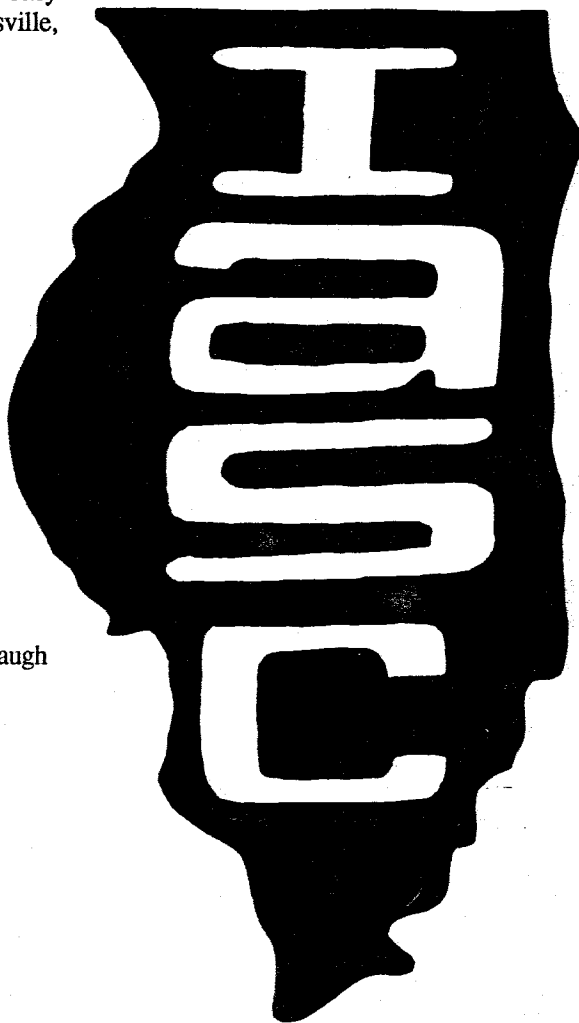

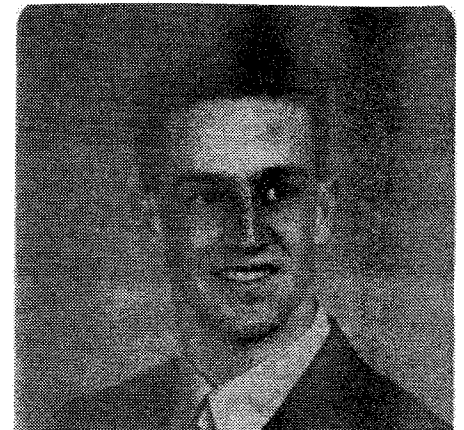
Sara Ulbrich, you are one of the best friends and one of the most wonderful people I will ever meet, and I will always love you.
